Banco de España is sponsoring the Annual Conference on Real-Time Data Analysis, Methods, and Applications in Macroeconomics and Finance to be held in Madrid, Spain, at Banco de España on Thursday and Friday, October 19–20, 2023.

The conference will bring together leading researchers who specialize in real-time analysis of economic data and will cover topics such as real-time macro- and financial econometrics, forecasting, and macroeconomic policy analysis, among others.

The organizers invite the submission of papers related to such topics as:

- Nowcasting, forecasting, and real-time monitoring of macroeconomic and financial conditions
- The use of real-time data in policy formulation and analysis
- New real-time macroeconomic and financial databases
- Real-time modelling and high-frequency financial data
- Survey data and their use in macro model analysis and evaluation
- Machine learning methods and real-time macroeconomics
- Probability forecasts, density forecasts, risk assessments and scenarios

Both theoretical and applied studies are welcome. Papers of potential interest to statistical agencies and policymakers are encouraged.
